

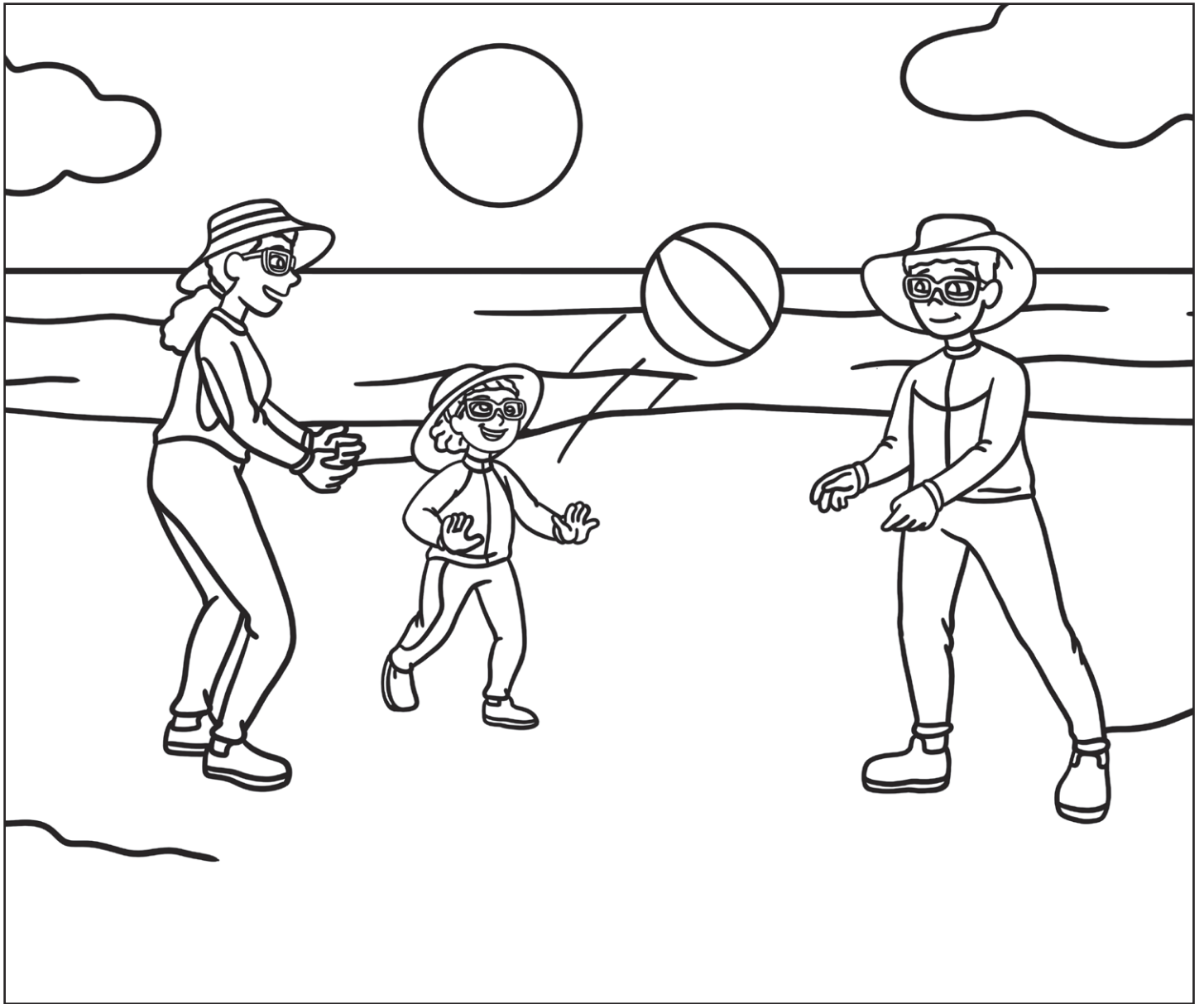

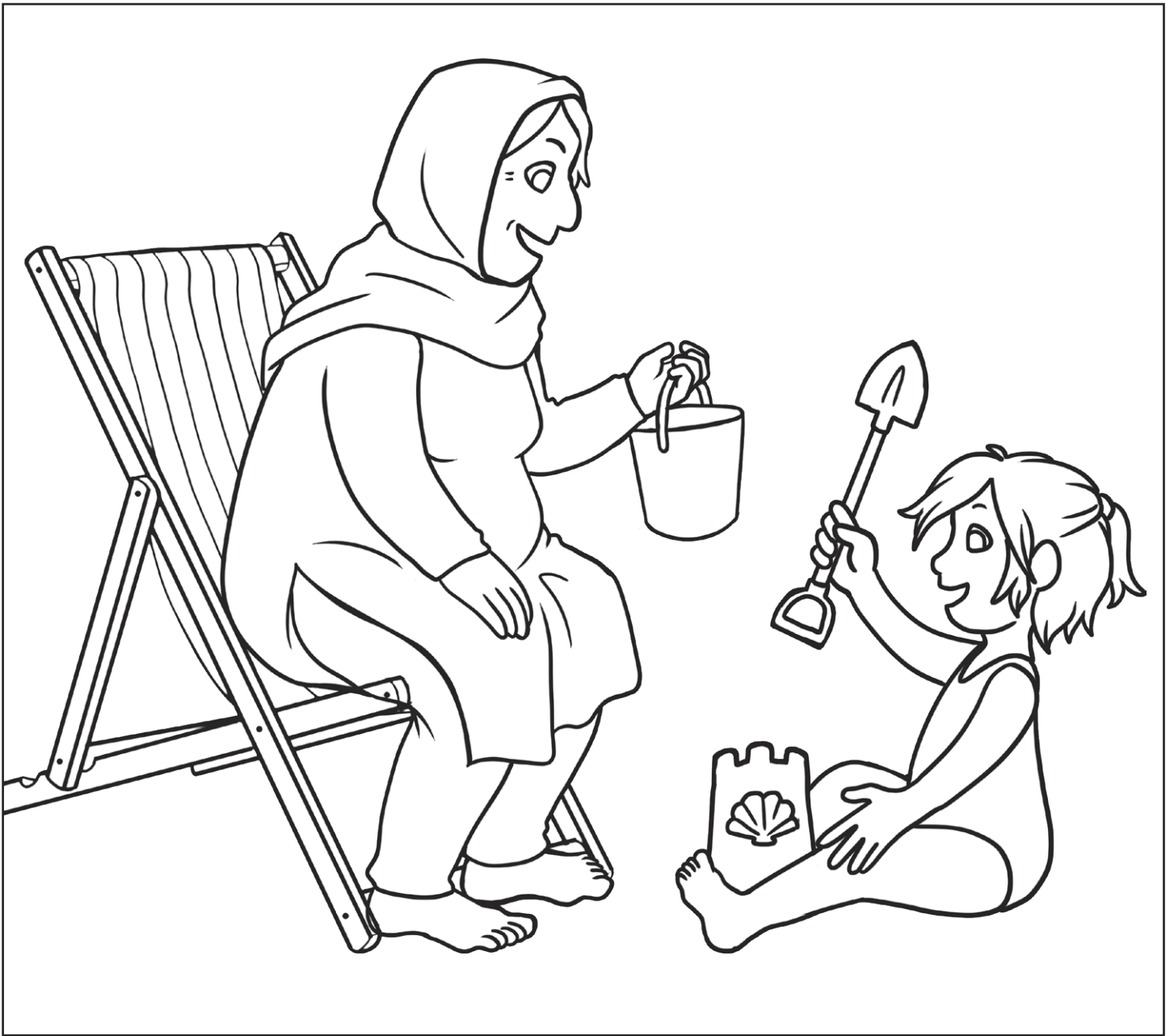
Colour the pictures to match the sentences.

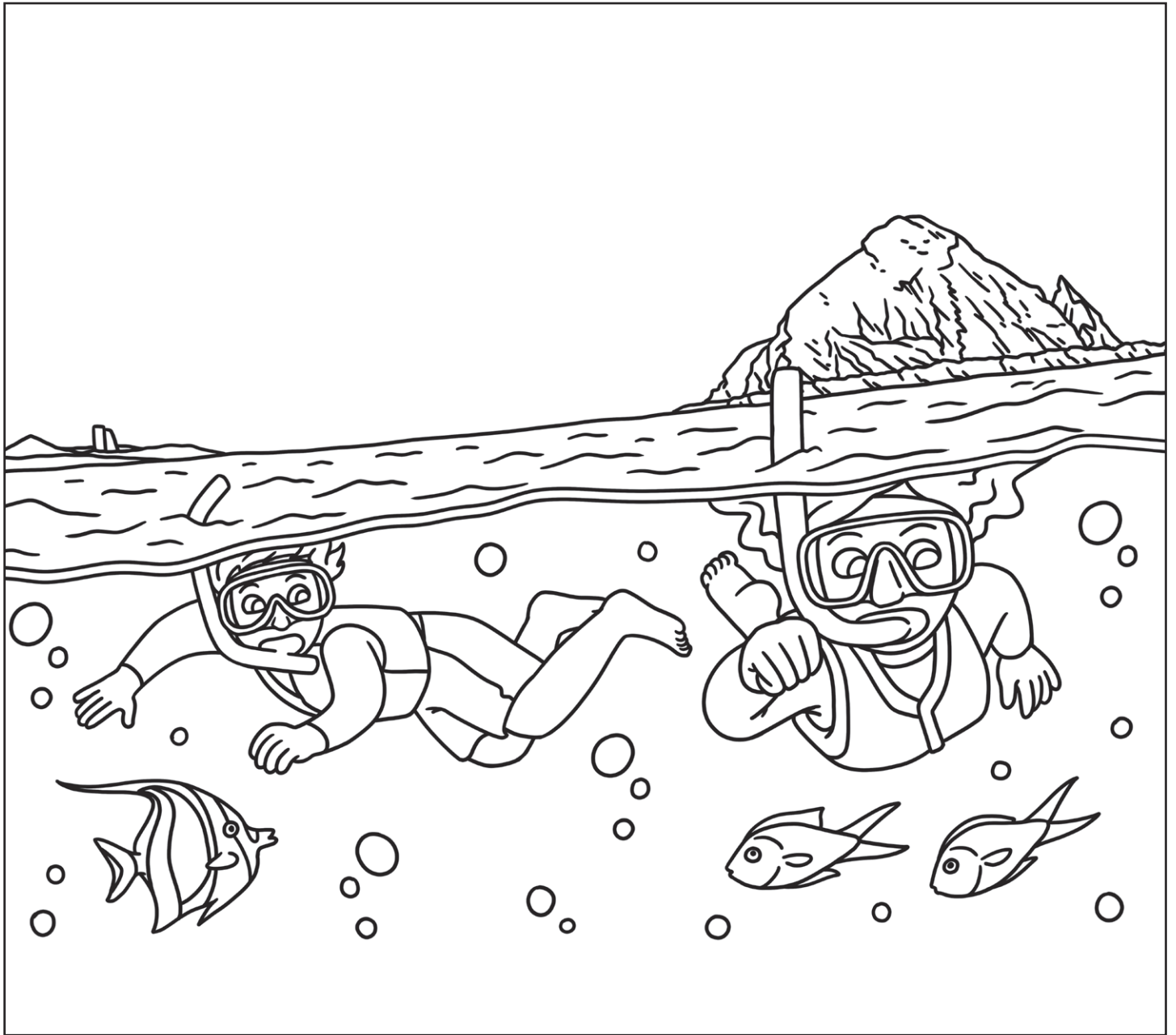
The family is playing with a pink and purple beach ball. They are wearing blue hats, and their bathing suits are orange and black. The sand is yellow, and the sea is dark blue.



The grandma is sitting on a green and yellow chair, and she's holding a small, red bucket. The girl is holding a pink spade, and she's wearing a brown swimming costume.



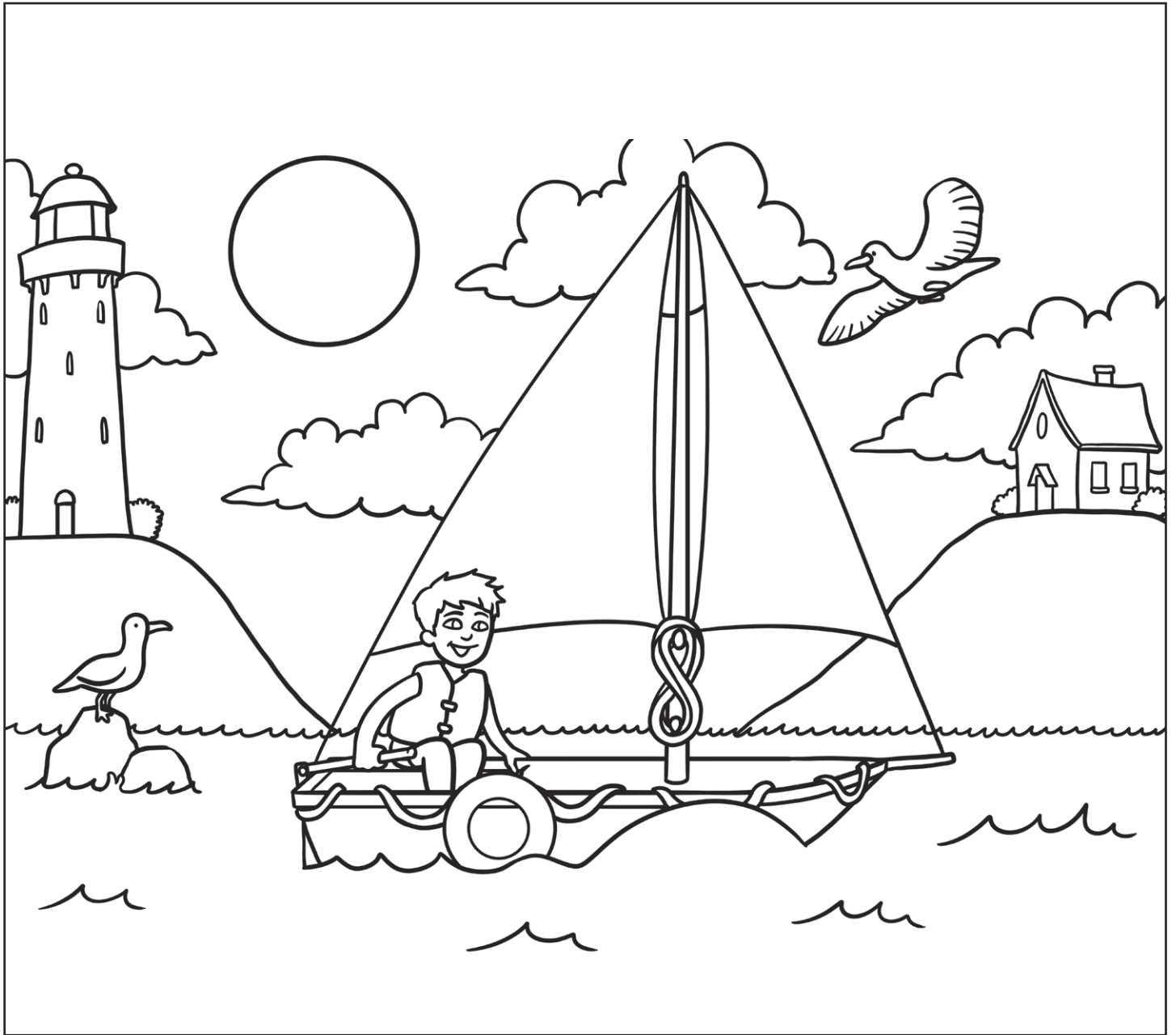
The mum and dad are sitting on a brown log, and the boy is sitting on green grass. The campfire is yellow and orange, and the family's camping tent is red.



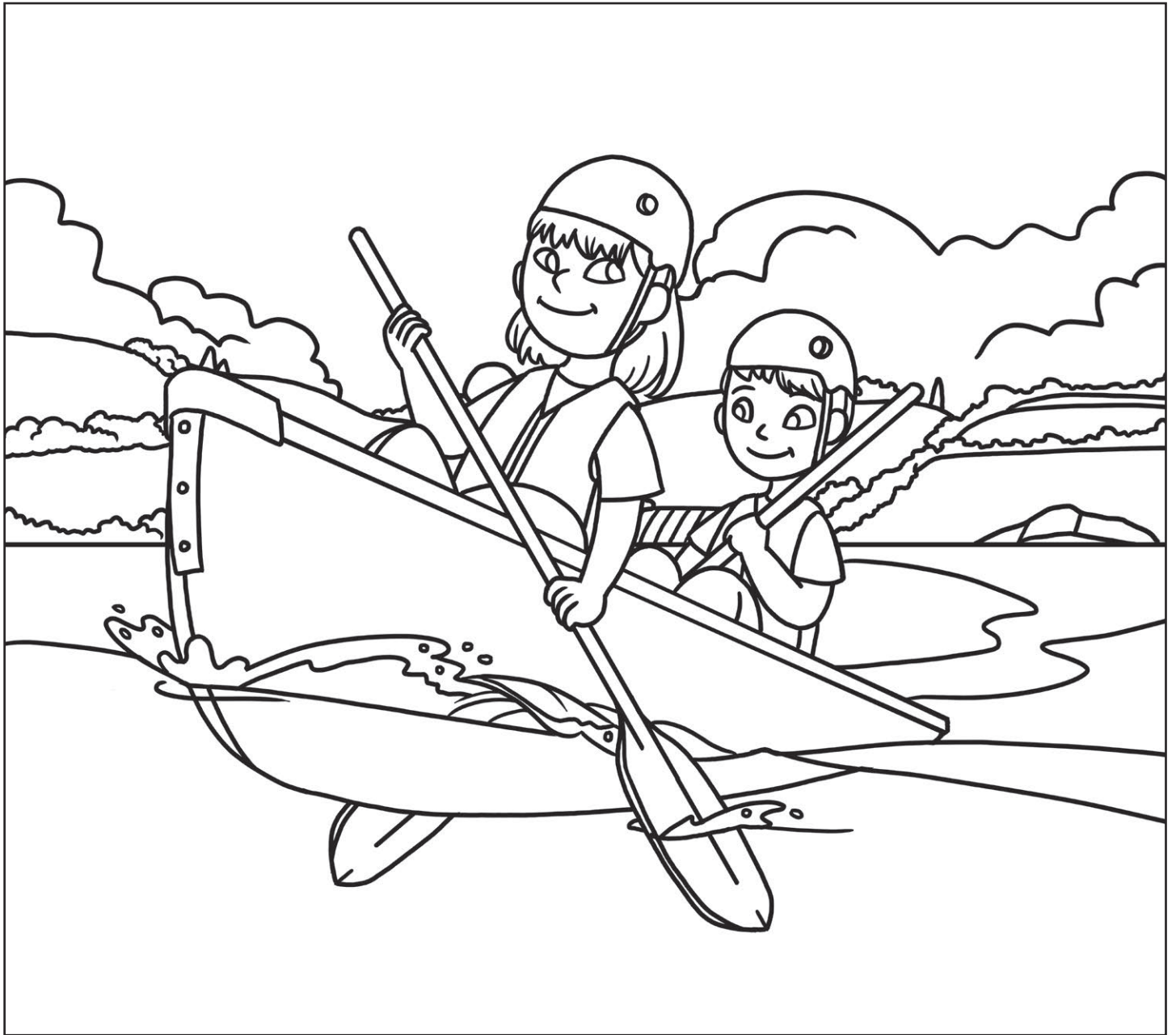
The two children are snorkelling in light blue water. The two small fish on the right are orange, and the fish on the left is yellow and black. The children are wearing yellow snorkels.
